
STORYTIMES MOVE INSIDE

JUNE'S BOOK REVIEW The Ballad of Laurel Springs by Janet Beard

Set in eastern Tennessee beginning in 2019, this novel begins in the present and goes back 100 years to women who are related by blood or circumstance. Each woman shares her experience. Their stories are all connected by old ballads called "murder ballads." Many of these songs arrived with settlers from Britain in the 18th Century. Each chapter title is the name of a ballad. This historical novel reminded me of my own ancestors. One family in the novel was called Reid which was my grandmother's maiden name. Most of my family in the past were from Kentucky and Tennessee. Fans of the novel Book Woman of Troublesome Creek by Kim Michele Richardson will enjoy this novel. An interesting family saga with a great sense of time and place.
